Notes:

- The prophets listed are only those with books in the Old Testament. Some of the prophets had messages that were addressed to both kingdoms. Some of the content is yet to be fulfilled in the last days.
- In 930 BC, because of their disobedience to the Lord, the kingdom was divided between Solomon's son, Rehoboam, and Solomon's servant, Jeroboam. Rehoboam ruled over the tribes of Judah and Benjamin, becoming the southern kingdom called Judah. Jeroboam ruled over the remaining ten tribes, which was called Israel, the northern kingdom. 1 Kings 11, 12.
- The northern kingdom of Israel fell to Assyria in 722 BC. The ten tribes of Israel scattered to other nations and are known as the "Ten Lost Tribes of Israel."
- The southern kingdom of Judah had three waves of captivity to Babylon, 605 BC, 595 BC, and 586 BC. Their captivity ended in 535 BC. With two added years to return home, they served a 70-year captivity. After their return, kings were not reinstated in Judah.
